In the family room, Giannoulias conjured happy memories by recreating a brick fireplace reminiscent of the one Bobbi had in her childhood home in Indiana. Custom-designed plum sofas, covered in a forgiving outdoor fabric, flank either side of the brick hearth, while a woven rattan coffee table by Palecek and two small children's chairs round out the mix of kid-friendly furniture.

Smart built-in storage holds children's toys and books-this mom wasn't going to banish her kids to the basement because of clutter-creating playtime accessories. "Open shelving is beautiful," Bobbi concedes, "but we wanted someplace where toys and books could be put away and we wouldn't have to look at the stuff." One cabinet also houses a television, which the mother of two boys and one girl prefers to be out of sight. "It encourages kids to do things other than watch TV," she says.

The sitting room, commonly a formal room, features four chairs equally accommodating to adults enjoying cocktails or children reading. "It's a dual-purpose room," says Giannoulias. "Most sitting rooms are pretty formal, but they didn't want the home to feel too proper, so we talked about making it double as a reading room." A fireplace there provides some classic architecture, while a wool wallpaper envelops the room. "It's very cozy and textural and feels like you're surrounded by a soft blanket," the designer adds. A suzani tapestry from Jayson Home hangs as art, covering a large wall that demanded something visually interesting. A chandelier from Currey & Co. gently alights from the ceiling and offers a dose of sophistication.

Custommade benches in an outdoor Perennials fabric and a built-in banquette in wipeable vinyl surround a zinc-top table on all sides. "The kitchen table is enormous," Bobbi says, "and with banquette seating, it's easy to pile a large number of family and friends around it. It's amazing."

The back wall tile by Porcelanosa matches the color of the cabinets perfectly. The parents prepare family dinners with appliances by Sub-Zero and Wolf while the kids help themselves to beverages from convenient fridge drawers. "Bobbi is very thoughtful in her approach to being functional," explains Giannoulias. "She considers things like, how are the kids going to get drinks?"

The interior designer put as much thought into the bedrooms as the main rooms. A nautical-themed room painted in navy appealed to one son, while another room sheathed in pink and furnished with vintage nightstands and marble tops of the same hue charmed the daughter. Tucked underneath each child's bed is a trundle for all those sleepovers. The master bedroom, however, skews a little dramatic and glamorous with dark wine walls and a Tibetan fur-covered bench perched on Lucite legs.

Bobbi is certain the internet led her in the right direction. "We wanted our home to be inviting to guests and a family of five and a dog," she says. "We have a beautiful, cohesive space that doesn't compromise comfort or function."
