



ELLE DECOR found the perfect setting for its 2015 Modern Life Concept House in the heart of Miami's burgeoning Wynwood Arts District. Here, aging warehouse walls have been turned into vibrant and original canvases by an international mix of street artists, transforming the neighborhood into a modern, world-class destination for collectors and art lovers alike.

The Modern Life Concept House was unveiled to coincide with the kick off of Design Miami and Art Basel. The two-story mural by Linda Hornig is a nod to the neighborhood's signature art form and takes full advantage of the 23-foot ceiling that served as the designer's inspiration.

In open spaces, "it's important to create architecture and structure," notes Martin, who designed the screen separating the living and dining areas. The room is grounded by a series of low pieces—including the B&B Italia sectional sofa and oak-and-leather dining chairs surrounding a color-infused dining table.

KITCHEN

250 Wynwood is the first in a series of sustainably built work/live residences planned for the neighborhood. And sustainability is central to the Concept House's vision of urban living. Working in partnership with kitchen designer Daniele Busca of Scavolini, Martin chose white Scavolini custom cabinetry that not only reinforces the gallery-like feel—setting off the Gaggenau appliances like artwork—it's made from 100% recycled wood and water-based lacquers. Caesarstone quartz surfaces complete the sleek, sustainable vision.
