







THE FRONT DOOR, in striking red-orange, is the first indication of the wonders that awalt inside the Pacific Heights three-bedroom home designed and decorated by San Francisco's Niche Interiors. In color, it echoes many similarly-hued accents inside; in spirit, it signifies exuberance, a sense of play — and, as it happens, remarkably open minds.

risks they were willing to take paid off: from the dark and dramatic wallpaper in the dining room to

POR JENNIFER, who founded her ecocorracious firm in 2007, the renovation was one to which she could easily retate. "Niche has always worked with young families," she says, "but now that I have a two-year-old of my own. I'm even more attuned to designing functional, beautiful, family-friendly spaces. Meredith and Brian were struggling to create a space that was sophisticated, but also wellorganized and suitable for their toddlerson. The last thing they wanted was a boring, beige home."

CUE THE PERSIMMON PAINT. The patterned honeycomb rug. The hexagon wallpaper. The chandelier made of hand-blown glass.

"OVERALL, this home is proof that life with a toddier doesn't have to be limbed to stain-resistant microfiber sofas," Jennifer says, "Smart fabric choices, non-toxic stain protection for rugs and uphotstery, and hidden storage solutions go a long way." (Speaking of hidden storage, the orange ofterman — a custom addition — conceats a collection of toys and stuffed animals under its brighthy-colored lid. "You'd never know," Jennifer remarks, "it's a super-stat.")

MEANWHILE, a tactful blend of color, texture, and geometric pattern add impact. Among a carefulty considered mix: two shimmery, striped amschairs; a mirror framed in faxor porcupine; grasscioth walls; and a master headboard upholstered in chocolable-brown velvet. "We used a mix of big and small scale prints, luxe fabrics, and a diamatic color palette to strike a balance between intrigue and restraint — that's a goal in each of our projects."

IN THIS CASE, it's a goal accomplished.



JENNIFER'S TIPS FOR CHOOSING COMPLEMENTARY ACCENT COLORS

1 PLAY FAVORITES.

"Does one color dominate your wardrobe or make its way into all of your Pinterest inspiration boards?" Jannifer asks. "Take cues from the colors you gravitate toward in your day-to-day life when deter-

2 LIMIT YOUR PALETTE.

"Stick to various tones of just one or two accent colors. This gives a space a more cohesive feet, color-wise."

3 THINK: BOLD OR MUTED?

"Pay attention to both the tone and saturation of your accent colors," the designer advises, "Bold, highly-saturated huse are attention-grabbers and work well in high-drams spaces, while muted colors bring more of a focus to other elements in a room."
