

Maloos Anvarian is an innovator and out-of-the-box thinker. An interior designer for over two decades, she has recently channeled her creative energy into a high-spirited couture line of furnishings and accessories aptly named Maloos. The line includes original creations and eclectic vintage and antique furnishings in need of new life. She refashions them as lighthearted, one-of-a-kind, "green" pieces.

"Our furniture line is for the designer or client who wants to break the mold," says Anvarian. "We have started a trend that makes one look at antiques and vintage pieces in a more refreshing way. We make them suitable for any style décor, not just for period rooms stuffed with period pieces." Besides being stylish and unique, each piece is sustainable. Her restyled antiques are the essence of reuse, and original pieces are crafted from environmentally friendly materials. She uses local craftsmen, too. "The Slow Food movement has brought attention to local producers and we're trying to do the same with our furniture design."

The revamped antiques are very popular and Anvarian enjoys how visitors come inside to touch a piece and marvel at its transformation. She encourages clients to bring her their own vintage pieces and she'll make them over into something more relevant and modern for their needs.
