Room to breathe in warm spaces

An appreciation of art and design was instilled in Kellev Flynn at a young age. When she was 6 years old, she started studying painting and drawing. "I grew up in an artistic household, with an industrial designer father," she says. "And beautiful furniture, antiques, objects and art were a part of my upbringing."With a degree in architecture from the University of Michigan, Flynn began her career in architecture and set design in Chicago and Boston. She relocated to San Francisco 20 years ago and decided to pursue a bachelor's in interdisciplinary art. But her continued work with various architecture firms ignited a new professional interest: interior design.

"I had always loved interiors but had seen interior design as a more personal pursuit - until I realized that it was the natural expression and extension of everything I had learned about art, design and environment," explains Flynn. So she returned to school once more, studying interior design at UC

In 2007, Flynn opened her practice, Kelley Flynn Interior Design (www.kellevflynn.com). In 2011 and 2012, she was selected for the Children's Support League's Heart of the Home Tour, and this year marks her inaugural participation in the San Francisco Decorator Showcase, which runs through Memorial Day. "I was inspired to transform the most modest room in the house into a space that is beautiful and elegant," she says of the top-floor powder room. The black-and-cream scheme features a pleated and shirred fabric treatment on the walls and wallpaper in a bold graphic on the ceiling.

"I don't limit my viewpoint to one style, but work with clients to incorporate what has personal meaning and beauty for them," says Flynn of her approach to design, "I like to create rooms that are warm, balanced and have room to breathe."

Practice patience: "Invest in quality pieces. Instead of simply buying furniture to fill a space, wait to find special, unique pieces that really speak to you. There is nothing more satisfying than truly loving the furniture and objects you live with - even after years of use."

contrary to what most people think. can be an opportunity to do something very bold and dramatic. Don't be afraid to use dark colors or patterns, I'm a fan of Jocelyn Warner's wallpapers for adding pattern." (www.jocelyn warner.com)

The big picture: "I have learned over time that clients can have a tendency to focus on one element piece or material in a room, rather than seeing how all the colors. textures and shapes work together. My suggestion is to keep an open mind and focus on the feeling or atmosphere you want to achieve. Looking at all your materials together or putting together image boards can help to keep your overall aesthetic objective in mind."
