A once-seedy L.A. street is blooming.

Five years ago: Locals knew it as Skid Rose, with psychedelicpainted RVs parked for days and loitering characters. And now? Eco-friendly apartments and trendy shops and eats have moved in—like an edgier Abbot KinneyB oulevard. Hot spot: Between Google's Main Street offices to the west and Whole Foods on Lincoln Boulevard to the east. The crowd: Yogis, foodies, tech pros, artists. How to get around: Walk. Park in the garage of Archstone Venice (512 Rose Ave.), a new LEED Platinum, mixed-use development. Most businesses validate. Better yet, park your bike on the rack outside the Archstone. **Budget finds:** DNA Clothing (411 Rose; 310/399-0341) is half the price of stores like Fred Segal, and the tacos are tasty at La Fiesta Brava (423 Rose; 310/399-8005). -JENNY HONTZ
