# EAST MEETS WEST

"This house pays homage to George Washington Smith, the renowned architect who created Santa Barbara as we know it today," Bill Taylor says. "It's a statement in testimony to his style — the front door and stucco columns are exact replicas from his house."





aving lived and raised their children in the same house in their beloved Coral Gables, Fla., neighborhood for 25 years, a real estate developer and his wife decided it was time to build their dream home. "We loved the location, ambiance and lush vegetation of our neighborhood, which had once been a natural hammock," the wife explains. "We had a particular fondness for the property directly across the street from our house, as it is situated on a secluded end of a

natural lake. When a 'For Sale' sign unexpectedly appeared; we called the realtor and purchased it the same day."

The couple then commissioned the Taylor & Taylor Partnership — their first choice for the rebuild project. "They envisioned a timeless, gracious, personalized home that would serve as a welcoming gathering place for their children and grandchildren," says architect William Taylor, who took inspiration for the home's classic architectural style from the iconic Mediterranean estates of

old Santa Barbara, Calif. "We wanted a home that suited the historic feel of Coral Gables and felt the two aesthetics were very similar," the husband says. "Bill was very strict about maintaining the integrity of the architecture, both exterior and interior, in every detail."

Upon tear down of the original structure, the site revealed a slight incline that slopes down to the lake and peninsula. The acre-and-a-half plot offered a fortunate and unusual (for South Florida) sense of terrain that was the driving force for the floor plan of interior spaces that unfold with





an angled view to the lake. Taylor positioned the 10,000-square-foot home straight on the property, but with all interior axes angled toward the lake. The house overlooks the finger of the lake, which creates the look and feel of a private lagoon — one that attracts a multitude of water birds and evokes a sense of serenity that carries through to the indoors.

As for the interiors, designer Phyllis Taylor's response to the challenge of including existing furnishings into the decor scheme speaks to the careful consideration of scale and proportion. Accordingly, the decor features a very personalized, un-decorated look that defies typecasting and reflects the owners' reserve and good taste. An eclectic marriage of family heirlooms and repurposed furnishings pairs happily with an assemblage of new pieces that range from contemporary to traditional, with accent pieces collected from the couple's travels to Japan providing a subtle Asian theme as a unifying thread.

A sense of refined, understated elegance initiates from the main entry, where gleaming

cream and Jerusalem Gold marble done in a frame checkerboard pattern lends a sense of presence. Nearby, a mélange of subtle details adds up to one big effect in the living room. Here, walnut hardwood flooring makes an easy transition from the entry and grounds the space with warm wood tones. An unusually large Oushak area rug in the home's organic palette of gold, orange and green was the designer's starting point. The generous-sized space features two social groupings; the larger of which includes sofas from the owners' previous residence and striped chairs — reproductions of a 1920s style made famous by renowned British architect Edwin Lutyens — clad in bold cinnabar and cream.

Tall windows in the dining room portray a view to the front of the house, but the space opens onto a foyer that affords a rear view towards the patio and lake beyond. From the leafy patterns on the dining chairs and the area rug, to the green grasscloth wall covering, subtle Florida references fill the space. Believing that a simple paint finish on the walls would be too bland, the designer introduced the layer of texture in a leafy bamboo green to balance and reflect the light softly in a way that paint wouldn't.

The kitchen serves as a bridge between the home's formal and informal living spaces and is a warm gathering place on its own, with a large island and sun-drenched breakfast room. The space features





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cream marble flooring, and a ceiling articulated in herringbone brick and embedded with

The capacious loggia is a main keystone of the design plan. "This space works so well for entertaining and has great traffic flow for large groups," the wife says. All of the main areas open onto this space, and it contains multiple seating and dining areas that accommodate large and small groups equally.
