That's particularly true this year for the venerable Kips Bay Decorator Show House, which has shape-shifted for its 40th anniversary. Before this year, the annual event benefitting the after-school and enrichment programs of the Kips Bay Boys & Girls Club has nearly always been staged in one of the stately townhouses on Manhattan's Upper East Side. This year, however, the Kips Bay folks have moved west — way west — to Riverside Boulevard and an area of town that's usually less associated with the patrician set than it is with a certain mop-topped real-estate developer with a taste for celebrity.

Scott created what he calls "A Gentleman's Study" for the show house, using handsome gray and blue textiles sourced from Holland & Sherry, the classic English menswear company. "The brutal and the refined" are balanced, Scott says, by juxtaposing a George VII writing table and a Vladimir Kagan Lucite-leg chaise with a bronze-and-smoked-glass Paul Evans shelving unit and a large-scale abstract canvas by Larry Zox. "These unexpected and understated pairings give the room a subtle tension," Scott says.
