

The Trend: Technology & Texture




"Technology continues to play a key role in current design trends. Embracing the innovations is certainly popular this season - whether it's automated glass sliding doors that open to a 90-

degree corner of a room with the simple touch of a button, or an iPhone app that controls a hydraulic hinge system for a secret wine cellar - we think outside of the box and utilize the unexpected. Texture is a major design element. We've utilized it by layering luxurious textures to create surfaces that haven't always been adorned, such as textured wood floors, horsehair walls, or raked cedar ceilings. We've even gone so far as to wrap the horsehair on panels for a concealed acoustical treatment."

The Trend: Hidden Features



"Hidden features is a hot trend right now that I have been embracing in my work for years; I love the less is more mantra. But now more than ever we are seeing it being used in lighting, appliances for kitchen and bath, and even spaces like a powder room that can be completely hidden with incorporated millwork design, which is great for city dwellers who want to maximize space."

The Trend: 360° Silhouettes



"In spite of resistance from clients, designers love to float furniture in residential spaces. Typical New England colonial architecture might dictate placing furniture against walls. But open plan spaces suggest otherwise. Thankfully, manufacturers are coming out with new upholstery and occasional pieces that beg to be viewed in 360 degrees. This spring, look for these edgy forms to showcase the interplay between positive and negative space and use texture to play up surface contrast."

"Kitchens aren't just for humans anymore. This spring, homeowners are incorporating their furry family members into their kitchen design plans. The Trend: Saturated Jewel Tones



"In the past 18 months, at least half the clients we've collaborated with loved our concepts for cabinetry (and millwork in general) finished in saturated jewel tones. The color palette runs the gamut from deep blues and greens to warm reds and even black. And the finish is anywhere on the spectrum from matte to gloss. It's bold, certainly. And the effect is moody, dramatic and luxurious. We've painted entire rooms in the same color as the cabinetry or millwork so that decorative elements such as lighting, furnishings and artwork really stand out against that monochromatic backdrop."
