

French and Italian drawings and paintings, as well as Portuguese pottery and hand-painted tiles.

Purchased in 2004, the house took six months to renovate; the couple used natural themes and materials to bring the outside in and make the most of the Florida surroundings. Most flooring is composed of giant 36-by-36 gray Bateig Azul limestone squares from Portugal that are cool underfoot. "Many people mistake them for concrete," notes Scurtis. The kitchen gleams with white Statuaria marble counters and window shades. with a cheerful monstera-leaf pattern on white fabric.

WALL ART Wallpaper abounds. "I am fanatical about wallpaper; it is an often overlooked decorative element," says Scurtis. "It fills a void and creates visual interest. The past five years have seen a renaissance of great wallpaper - modern designs and reprints of vintage patterns. It's appropriate almost anywhere in a house."

In her living room, hand-painted, silk chinoiserie wallpaper depicts a tranquil pond scene and "is a giant piece of artwork," says Scurtis. It was acquired through the David Sutherland Showroom at the Design Center of the Americas (DCOTA) in Dania. "A Fromental artist in London designed it based on dimensions I provided," says Scurtis. "The colors (fuchsia, green and orange) are both whimsical and found in my garden."

A symmetrical grille-moderne pattern from Studio Printworks integrates undulating scrolls into disciplined grid lines in the dining room. "It creates an architectural element," declares Scurtis. Studio Printworks also supplied the lively white dots on cream wallpaper in the playroom of sons Jonathan, 5, and Kristian, 3. Antique chairs float across the powder room's black-and-white walls and ceiling in a playful pattern from Thibaut.

Scurtis wanted to create a formal but approachable living-room space. "Since there isn't a foyer or vestibule in the home, the space had to welcome and exude hospitality," she says. "It was important to me not to use too much furniture." As such, the

furnishings are a harmonious blend of Regency exuberance, antiques from other periods and thrift-shop finds. The living-room ensemble includes a grouping of Sheridan sofas. French bergère chairs and an industrial-style Swedish coffee table with black metal legs. Scurtis acquired the sofas from Incurable Collector in West Palm Beach, where the proprietor told her a remarkable rumor regarding the find - the sofas once had a place in the 19th-century White House. "I reupholstered them in soft sand-colored linen with an ivory double welt," she says. The other items came from Lars Bolander Ltd. in West Palm Beach.

The Dennis & Leen rock-crystal chandelier grabbed the designer immediately. "It was destined for the living room," she recalls. "Rock crystal is like decorating with diamonds," says Scurtis. "Hove the texture and the reflective qualities." A housewarming gift from her in-laws, the chandelier (from Jerry Pair at the DCOTA in Dania) will always have a treasured place of honor.

The dining room juxtaposes Scurtis' parents' French provincial inlaid-wood table; lyre-back chairs from Pierre Deux's DCOTA showroom; and a 1950s French Riviera art-deco sideboard with a striated Madagascar-palissandre exterior and a sycamore interior, acquired from Susane R Lifestyle Boutique in the Miami Design District. This room's rock-crystal chandelier came from a Palm Beach estate sale. \*Both form and function are very important," Scurtis says. "Function trumps form, but as a designer, I like things to be pleasing."
