## CALLE CONTROL OF Architecture The Arts & Distinctive Design









You would imagine having a traditional Hamptons meets California 1920s cottage style oceanfront residence on three lots in Malibu was the stuff of dreams, but for Mrs. Nancy Daly it became a reality. A consummate host, a philanthropist, an avid reader, a mother of three, and grandmother of five, Mrs. Daly was able to enjoy a warm, relaxed and comfortable gathering place for herself, her family and closest friends.

Her dream came true through her collaboration with interior designer David Phoenix, architect Steve Giannetti and builder John Finton. "She wanted the Pacific Ocean to be the backdrop and focus, with the interiors taking a back seat and the people being the color," says Phoenix. The 13,000 square foot house was built as a series of attached smaller buildings. "I wanted to make a house that felt as if had always been there, but with a modern sense of space and light," says architect Steve Giannetti. "We used as much glass as possible and set the middle section of the house slightly back from the coastline to create a more private outdoor space while still capitalizing on the long vistas of the Pacific."

ABOVE The kitchen is made up of a large cooking and preparation area, a bar counter area, and an adjacent breakfast room. Waterworks tile was selected for the backsplash while granite was chosen for the island, over which are suspended two Paul Ferrante antique light fixtures. Rattan back Mimi London bar chairs are set in front of a granite bar counter with a large antique pine console set in the generous kitchen space behind it. A cylindrical Paul Ferrante chandelier hangs above the breakfast room's table, which is surrounded by American painted ladderback chairs whose pillows are covered in a Scalamandre fabric. A circular Philippe Starck rug set on Richard-Marshall wood floors delineates the space and complements the tones of the F. Schumacher & Co. curtains.

The black stripes on the Paul Ferrante chandelier plays off of the faux bone inlay John Rosselli mirror from Hollyhock. A striped Aga John rug adds pattern to the space.





Giannetti used board and batten siding and shingles, all painted white, with Santa Barbara sandstone to anchor the structure, masterfully achieving an updated and fresh take on a Craftsman house appropriate to its time and oceanfront locale. "Nancy wanted the palette to play off of the color of the sand. She wanted a beachy, nautical theme that was low maintenance," says Phoenix. "We used limestone for all the floors and thirty foot wide pocket doors for the living room, both of which allowed for a seamless transition from the outdoors to the indoors."

For the light-flooded and large living room that has twenty-two foot ceilings they devised two seating areas—a sofa facing the ocean with two club chairs and two armchairs arranged around a low table make up the grouping nearest the fireplace with another having a sofa with two more club chairs and a pair of bentwood chairs that perfectly complement the subtle, soothing, sandy palette. The spaces are unified by an enormous cream-colored diagonally striped hook rug, which adds texture to the room. Included in the room's plan, Phoenix designed a casual dining area with a maple table surrounded by Early American style chairs.



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opposite top "You feel like you're on a boat when you're in the master suite," says Phoenix, who designed the space to include a cozy seating area by the window, a writing area with a French desk from Ralph's Antiques paired with a Papa Bear chair and more seating with two Paul Ferrante occasional chairs flanking the bedroom's fireplace. Delicate sconces and a chandelier, all from Paul Ferrante, provide soft lighting throughout while Holland & Sherry shades provide protection from the sun. A custom cabinet at the foot of the bed cleverly conceals a television and a large Elizabeth Eakins rug in delicate tones with subtle repeating squares unifies the areas of the master bedroom.

LEFT Blues run throughout the house and are evident in Mrs. Daly's bedroom, where antique Swedish nightstands are set on either side of the bed whose headboard is covered in soft blue and green floral Hodsoll McKenzie fabric. The client's antique plates add a pop of porcelain blue and the Hollywood at Home accent pillow perfectly ties in all the elements.



ABOVE Builder John Finton and architect Steve Giannetti masterfully achieved the updated Craftsman and California beach house aesthetic. They chose shingles and board and batten painted white as primary materials with Santa Barbara sandstone to anchor the structure complemented by French limestone flooring from Exquisite Surfaces. The living room's pocket doors allow an entire wall to open onto the terrace, where David Sutherland deck furniture with Ralph Lauren covered blue and white striped pillows and a matching awning provide a nautical note.

Directly above this great room on the second floor, a knotty-pine paneled library has sliding doors that open to overlook the living room and create a loft-like feature. "The kitchen was always to be the hub of the house," says Phoenix of the large open space comprised of a cooking area, a bar counter, a breakfast nook and a family room. "It accommodates twenty without feeling crowded."

A terrace expands almost the length of the entire house and provides two outdoor cooking areas, a fire pit, a pool and multiple seating arrangements. At one end of the house are the guest quarters with four identical suites for Daly's children and other visitors. For her grandchildren, she built a bunkroom complete with costumes to play dress-up. "The master suite is flooded with light as it has windows on three sides," says Phoenix. A seating area near windows, a desk facing the ocean, two club chairs by a fireplace, a terrace and a generous master bath complete the private sanctuary.

"The biggest gift of all is that after it was completed, Nancy would include me in some of her gatherings," the interior designer says. "I've gotten a lot of enjoyment from seeing individuals take pleasure in this home. It's exactly what Nancy wanted. A beautiful place where the people she loved can gather." [1]
